### (1) NJSGC associate accepts Coastal Management Fellowship

Ms. Jackie Specht, a Rutgers University graduate student and NJSGC fellowship applicant, was recently matched with Maryland's Chesapeake and Coastal Service to continue studying the beneficial reuse of dredge material.

#### As Specht explains:

"I have joined Chesapeake and Costal Service at the Maryland Department of Natural Resources as the NOAA Costal Management Fellow. During my two-year fellowship I will evaluate and identify potential practices for the beneficial reuse of dredge material. I will then take my finds to develop policies and decision-support tools to aid these practices in Maryland Department of Natural Resources waters. Over the course of the fellowship, I will so have the opportunity to participate in conferences, take advantage of professional development opportunities, and interact with other NOAA Coastal Management fellows at three annual events."

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### (2) Project PORTS now in its 10th year of promoting Oyster Restoration

Project PORTS (Promoting Oyster Restoration through Schools) is a unique program where students K-12 are given the unique experience of practicing environmental stewardship firsthand while helping to restore critical oyster habitats. According to New Jersey Sea Grant Shellfish Aquaculture Program Coordinator Lisa Calvo, also of Rutgers University Haskin Shellfish Research Laboratory (HSRL):

"The program is founded on the belief that stewardship grows from an underlying appreciation and understanding of the environment" (via SEBS/NJAES Newsroom).

So far, thousands of young participates from 30 partner schools have constructed over 29,000 shell bags that are now settlement surface and home for more than 30 million young oysters. And as a direct result, students become more environmentally engaged and aware, especially in regards to ecosystem complexity.
