New Jersey Sea Grant received funding support through the 2016 NOAA Sea Grant national strategic investment in aquaculture workshops and training events to increase awareness among stakeholders about the conflict in the intertidal zone between critical habitat for the endangered Red Knot and permitting zones for the oyster aquaculture industry. Ms. Calvo was part of the team that coordinated a stakeholder workshop that pulled together relevant scientific knowledge to indentify data and management gaps that state and federal agencies, conservation groups, and the oyster industry could use for adaptive management that would result in a win-win scenario.

Sea Grant Extension Assembly and Communicators Meeting 2017 in Astoria, OR

During the first week of October, NJSGC's Associate Director for Sea Grant Administration/Director of Research & Extension [Dr. Peter Rowe](#) and Communications Specialist [Danica Bellini](#) traveled to the West Coast to attend Sea Grant's biennial networking conference hosted by Oregon Sea Grant. The three-day event was held in the picturesque city of Astoria, located right on the Columbia River near the Pacific Ocean. Members from all 33 programs of the national network were welcome to attend.



Presentation topics and breakout discussions revolved around several informative sessions, including:

- 'Planning for and Reacting to Crises: Lessons Learned from the Budget Situation'
- 'Mindfulness and Stress Management'
- 'Managing a Communications Program'
- 'Future Scenario Planning: How Should Sea Grant Adapt?'

The conference concurrently took place with the 2017 [Sea Grant Academy](#), where K-12 Program Coordinator/Sea Grant Program Associate [Diana Burich](#) represented NJSGC.

Attendees also had unique opportunities to explore the surrounding area, including a field trip option to Cape Disappointment State Park in Washington.

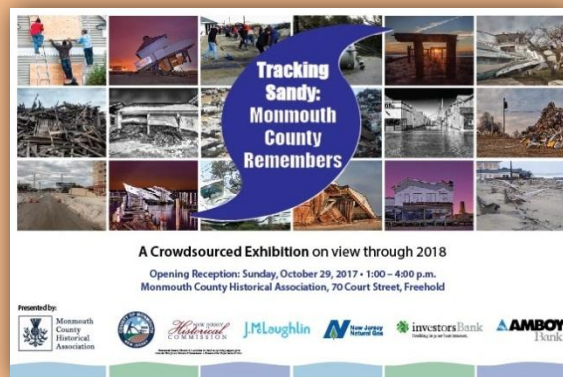
