
Rutgers University graduate student <u>Jackie Specht</u> was recently awarded NOAA's Coastal Management Fellowship through the New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium. She is currently working with Maryland's Chesapeake and Coastal Service to continue studying the beneficial reuse of dredge material. In the October 2018 edition of <u>Fellowship News</u>, Ms. Specht discusses her invaluable experience with the program thus far:

"I've been very fortunate to have been placed in such a dynamic and collaborative work environment. The nature of the [Department of Natural Resources] office has not only allowed me to advance my project further than I could have anticipated, but has allowed me to branch out and experience other aspects of coastal management that I may not have been able to otherwise."

NOAA's <u>Ocean Acidification Program</u> is currently soliciting proposals for studies investigating "ocean acidification monitoring strategies offering an observing system design that best characterizes and tracks ocean acidification with US Large Marine Ecosystems."

Letters of intent for this <u>"Regional Ocean Acidification Observing Optimization Study"</u> grant opportunity are due by January 7th, 2019.





To help kickoff the 2018-2019 school year, New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium hosted several "coastal experience" and marine science class fieldtrips at Sandy Hook. In honor of November's National American Indian Heritage Month, over 60 students had the special opportunity to participate in "Lenape and the Jersey Shore / Native Ways" excursions. Through teamwork and handson activities, students gained knowledge of New Jersey's coast and its original people, the Lenape.

October 29th, 2018 marked six years since Hurricane Sandy made landfall in the Garden State. New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium has partnered with the Central Jersey Club of the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Club (CJC-NANBPWC) to promote and diversify STEM activities throughout the local youth community. In early November, members of our education staff organized an afterschool program at the Sisters Academy of New Jersey in Asbury Park focused on the science of sand. Along with hosting several "coastal experience" field trips at Sandy Hook, the Consortium will continue to run and support such programs in association with the CJC-NANBPWC.

Throughout October, the National Sea Grant College Program spearheaded a #NationalSeafoodMonth social media campaign. NOAA also awarded 22 research grants totaling \$11 million for projects around the country designed to expand sustainable ocean, coastal, and Great Lakes aquaculture. A project entitled "Enhancing bivalve aquaculture through species improvement and diversification" will be funded and supported through New Jersey Sea Grant Consortium.
